Supervisor’s Salary Resolution: Dawn Sawicki-Franz motioned to raise the Supervisor’s salary to \$16,643.77, which is a 3% increase, seconded by Florence Sawicki. Ayes:5, Nays:5. Supervisor Titus broke the tie with a vote of nay, making the total opposed votes 6, motion failed. B. Treasurer’s Salary Resolution: Dawn Sawicki-Franz motioned to raise the Treasurer’s salary to \$18,650.21, which is a 3% increase, seconded by Florence Sawicki. Ayes:3, Nays:11, motion failed. C. Clerk’s Salary Resolution: Dawn Sawicki-Franz motioned to raise the Clerk’s salary to \$18,650.21, which would be a 3% increase, seconded by Florence Sawicki. Ayes:3, Nays:11, motion failed. <p>Supervisor’s Announcement: Titus discussed the Hough Road bridge, which cost a total of \$330,000 to the county, with the township’s share being under \$50,000. Titus also stated that he has applied for local road assistance on the Eagling Road bridge, which has an estimated cost of \$83,000. Marv Roberts, the township’s Road Commission Foreman is retiring at the end of April. He also stated that the Township has purchased 97 loads of limestone for the upcoming year. He also discussed the Tibbets’s Road Cemetery. The title company has completed a deed search for the property, and they were unsuccessful, so the next step for the township is to move forward with a quiet title action through the township attorney and the State of Michigan to secure a title for the cemetery. In addition, the township’s bond debt has been retired, and the 609 Burnell property should be closing within the next two weeks with Richmond Lenox EMS. He discussed how the township will be receiving COVID stimulus money, in the amount of \$323,368.00. The funds can only be used for responding to COVID-19 emergencies, addressing its economic effects, including providing aid to households, businesses, non-profits, and impacted industries such as tourism and hospitality. <p>and broadband infrastructure, and all funds must be spent on costs incurred on or before December 31st, 2024. Dawn Sawicki-Franz stated that the township would receive half of the funds this year, and the other half next year. Titus concluded his announcement by discussing the Planning Commission, and how they were working on marihuana related ordinances for the township, and once they had completed that, he would like them to work on a burn ordinance.</p> <p>Adjournment: Duane Hagle motioned to adjourn at 7:12 pm, seconded by Ron Rodzos.
